


**FROM THE PRINCIPAL, KATHY LLOYD-PARKER****House Music (for Years 1 – 13)

### Year 6

At Chilton, it is important that we provide learning experiences to develop internationally minded students who value and recognise their common humanity and a shared guardianship of the world. By facilitating, connecting and empowering the girls we are encouraging them to:

The Primary Years Programme is a curriculum that develops innovative thinking and modern learning. It allows us to prepare the girls for the challenges and change required in a fast paced world, by teaching the girls to search for meaning and understanding, to explore and to engage with relevant, challenging and significant learning.

## MIDDLE SCHOOL

### Year 8 Social Sciences

Term Two is building on the great work begun in Term One when we delved into Adolf Hitler, his life before and after World War 1. Students are now doing their own research into the life of the average German citizen during the 1930s and '40s.

Given that so much of history focuses on 'great men' and 'great battles', trying to find balanced sources about the 'average' person is no easy thing. The learning goals for this portion of our unit therefore are both *finding* information (about a difficult topic), and considering a time period from the *viewpoint* of the 'average' person. If you're looking for discussion starters for talking about this topic with your daughter, try these:

Are people like Adolf Hitler born 'that way', or do they become 'that way'?

What would a good source of information for 1930s Germany contain?



What would a good source of information for 1930s Great Britain contain?

Why do you think the Jews in Germany didn't 'fight back'?  
Could any of the things that happened in 1930s and 40s Germany happen in New Zealand?

### Cambridge Examinations

They must have their student ID with them and are required to write with blue or black pen. No devices can be present so these must be left in their locker or bags.
